With the global recyclables market in tumult and the COVID-19 pandemic layering on new burdens to facility operations and local government budgets, the urgent need to revamp our waste management and recycling systems has never been more acute. At latest count, California is only recycling 42 percent of its solid waste, a figure well short of the state's target of a 75 percent recycling rate by 2020. What will it take to establish the much talked about, but ever elusive, "Circular Economy?"

- With China and other foreign markets no longer accepting the vast majority of our recyclable materials, where is it ending up? What is not being recycled?
- How are local governments and industry partners adapting to the dramatic drop in recycling markets and bottle redemption centers? Which product types are the biggest contaminants, adding costs and complications to the system?
- Should California develop more in-state processing and manufacturing facilities capable of transforming our recyclables into material that is ready for reuse? What is the potential for new California jobs if we did more processing and manufacturing in our state?
- What should we expect from producers and retailers what role should they have in proper labeling and using recycled content material? What about funding, managing, and improving our source reduction, collection, and recycling operations?
- With pending legislation, ongoing rulemakings, a <u>newly formed commission</u>, and a ballot measure currently all in play, what can we expect in the coming months and year in recycling and reuse policy?
